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Enmore Broadband Update January 2025

My last review mentioned my requesting under the freedom of information act various documents relating to the tender process , decision and ultimate contract eventually won by Airband . I was sent approximately half of the requested documents amounting to over 650 pages !

The good news is that the contract with Airband has been cancelled and the majority of residences in Upper Enmore are now able to connect to Openreach's high speed fibre network .

The local committee , Connecting Devon and Cornwall , are no longer involved with solving the problem of Lower Enmore , this has been taken up by central government . My guess would be another 2 or 3 years .

Other than waiting there is one other option . Central government/OFCOM and BT have set up a company called “ Universal Service Obligation “ ,USO ,reached on 08007830223 .

The scheme works as follows :-

1. Call 08007830223 and register with USO .
2. Using your details USO will give the broadband possibilities . In my case it was Airband and EE mobile . Their system was at the time unaware of the Airband cancellation .
3. I called EE who informed me that the best they could achieve was a download speed of 4Mbits/sec i.e. below my current 8Mbits/sec .
4. EE sent an email to me confirming their offering and I forwarded it to USO .
5. At this point I need to state that there is a £3400 grant available to cover installation costs . USO took a few days to inform me that I could be connected at a cost of £100k+.

There are approximately 40 residences in Lower Enmore so if 30 commit to this scheme then the grants will cover the installation costs .

If you are interested please follow the above procedure .

The Willis Monument: The Story of Its Restoration

A nine and a half year 'headache' for Goathurst PCC was finally relieved at the end of 2024, when the 18th century, Grade II* listed monument in the churchyard was, at last, restored!



It all began in April 2015, when a visitor to St. Edward's church (who was also a member of the St Andrew's Conservation Trust) noted the 'exceptional' monument in the churchyard and that the Corinthian column was in a 'precarious state'.

SSH Conservation began work in October 2024. During the restoration of the chest and column, the decision was made to reveal its wide slab base to restore the visual impact of the monument as it was originally intended. This delayed the final completion date until December whilst suitable reclaimed slabs were sourced.

This 18th century monument has also contributed to 21st century facilities as scrap metal and lead from within have been taken to reclamation to benefit the SAPP fund!

The total cost of the restoration project, which has been filmed by The Local Film Company, is £19,408.80 (of which we can reclaim £3,078.80 from the Memorials Grant Scheme).

A special event to celebrate the restoration of this architecturally significant monument will be held in the spring of 2025.

Footnote: At the outset, as a member of the PCC nine years ago, I was not at all interested in the restoration of this monument and saw it as diverting us from more important issues, such as installing much needed toilet facilities!

However, having become a churchwarden and hearing our then new incumbent, Rev Eleanor King, being encouraged to 'maximise our assets' my attitude began to change, especially with the insistence of St Andrew's Conservation Trust that this monument was significant architecturally and worth saving. I began to appreciate both the significance and wealth of centuries of history and heritage that resides in St Edward's Church and our responsibility to preserve it for future generations.

Once we embarked on participation in the Heritage Open Days Annual Festival in 2019 and saw the tremendous response of visitors from far and wide, it dawned on me that, rather than seeing these monuments as ‘millstones’ they were in fact valuable assets and integral to our mission and outreach to the wider community. So many groups ask to visit the church to view this heritage making the need for adequate welfare facilities even greater.

As I reflect now, it seems incredible that the project was finally achieved within ten months! I have become increasingly aware of God’s timing and ‘hand’ in the restoration of the Willis monument and how important it is for us to respond to opportunities positively when they arise, rather than be daunted! Nothing is too hard or impossible if it is in keeping with God’s will and for His glory. Suddenly, ‘doors’ open, people are willing to help, and everything falls into place-it does seem like a minor miracle and the PCC can now heave a sigh of relief that it is no longer a burden, but an important part of our mission and outreach!

February 2025



As we come into February, the days are lengthening, and we are seeing lighter evenings. The snow has come and gone - hopefully! - and the days are warmer too. Maybe spring is around the corner!

If you have visited one of the churches during January you may have seen a Nativity Crib still in place and wondered if someone had forgotten to put it away! While the festivities of Christmas are concentrated around the latter part of December and early January, we recall the message of the birth of Jesus for forty days through to the beginning of February, to Candlemas on 2nd February.

At Candlemas we hear the great story of Jesus being taken as a baby to the Temple in Jerusalem by his parents and meeting with two older folk, Simeon and Anna. God had promised Simeon that he would see the Messiah before he died – and God kept that promise. Simeon recognised Jesus as the Messiah as soon as Mary and Joseph brought the baby to him, and Anna too joined the celebration. Simeon was inspired to say what we now call the Nunc Dimittis – *Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace*, and which talks of Jesus coming as a light into the world. It is sung or said at Evensong today and sometimes used as the closing words at a funeral.

On this day – 2nd February - we reflect how Jesus came to be the Light of the World - to illuminate dark and difficult places and bring restoration and reconciliation; to bring hope for better times. We might think about how lit candles illuminate a darkened room.

The service in Nether Stowey will be a Christingle Service during which we will decorate an orange with fruit, a red band and a lighted candle to remind us that God so loved the world that he sent Jesus to be our light. Please do come along to the Church Centre in Nether Stowey at 11:00am and enjoy

this symbol of the Light of Christ. The service is short, suitable for the whole family, and there are sweets to be eaten!

Candlemas is also a turning point in the church's year, as we bring to an end the celebration of the birth of Christ, and we turn towards the story of Holy Week and Easter.

Thank you for all that is happening in our communities bringing hope for better times.

Enmore Parish Council News

At the time of writing this update we are still awaiting new line painting on the main road through Enmore and the installation of flashing lights at the school (to reduce the speed limit from 30 to 20 mph when needed for safety, principally when pupils are being delivered to or collected from school). Enmore Parish Council has also approved the purchase and installation of 5 horse warning/awareness signs and 2 further wildlife signs. We hope that, once completed, these measures will improve road safety for all road users and residents.

At our January meeting the Parish Council budget for the 2025/26 financial year was discussed and the decision was taken to ask for the same amount of precept (£5,253) to fund the work of the Parish Council. However, although this is a nil increase for the Council, the Parish element of Council Tax will increase by 2.79% (because the tax base over which the precept is spread has apparently decreased since last year). We are sorry that our residents will see an increase in this item next year despite our efforts to contain costs. We will now have now had the same amount of precept for three consecutive years, which we won't be able to continue indefinitely. However, we try to run the Council without extravagance and on the basis of giving residents value for money.

The January meeting also approved the repayment of half the outstanding loan (taken out when the land for the new cemetery/Jubilee Meadow was bought). Originally the loan was to be repaid over 25 years, of which 8 years remain. The gradual repayment of the capital and the payment of interest is one of the larger regular items of Council expenditure - in future this will be half the previous amount. This repayment has largely been possible as a result of savings in the Clerk's remuneration (relative to budget and historic figures) over the last couple of years - thank you Debbie! The decision also reflects the difference between the rather higher rate of interest charged on the loan and the rate the Council earns on the money.

Councillor Amanda Hubbard has been reporting to Council on the Somerset Bus Partnership's activities and proposals. If there is sufficient demand for an Enmore bus service, your Council will lobby for this. We invite your input on what type of service would meet your needs and whether you would really use it if we had a bus service again. It appears that there is some funding available to improve services to new housing developments (many of which are near existing bus routes) but that the needs of older settlements like ours are being ignored. Other options, such as community car-sharing, might also be worth considering and this could be a fruitful topic to discuss at the Annual Village meeting in May.

Flooding has been an ongoing concern, especially when rainfall has been high, and the risks are exacerbated by blocked road drains and ditches. A special thank you to the Webber family for clearing ditches adjacent to their land, and thank you to any other residents who have been contributing to regular maintenance to improve drainage and reduce the risk of flooding of susceptible properties. Finally, a reminder that your Parish Council is here to represent and serve our local community. We welcome your suggestions and feedback.
STOP PRESS: Our new MP, Ashley Fox, has suggested a meeting with the Parish Council, possibly next month with the date still to be finalised. We plan to raise ongoing issues like road repairs, poor broadband speeds in Lower Enmore and lack of public transport. If there are other subjects you would like us to raise, please contact Debbie McIlroy (Parish Clerk).

Local and Regional Weather Report

Weather lore as usual has an appetite for gloomy forecasts, such as “If the sun shines on Candlemas day (February 2nd) hard frost is sure to set in” also “As much ground as is covered with sun on Candlemas day, will be covered with snow before Lady day (25th March)” and “If by the 10th the snowdrops are out, More snow through the month without a doubt.”. However, on a slightly more positive note “If Candlemas-day be fair and bright, Winter will have another flight”, but “if Candlemas-day brings clouds and rain, Winter is gone and won't come again.” and “If Valentine's day (February 14th) be bright and fine, half the winter is left behind”. However “If it freezes on St. Matthias'-day (February 24th) it will freeze for a month together”. Finally “When the cat lies in the sun in February, she will creep behind the stove in March” and “If it thunders in February, it will frost in April”. But again, more hopefully, “If February give much snow, A fine summer it doth foreshow”

December was unsettled with rain and mist and mild temperatures, but very little sunshine. Storm Darragh on the 6th brought heavy rain and damaging gales. Nearly 9 days out of 10 days saw cloudy weather or rain and only 3 days out of 10 saw sunny or partly sunny weather.

Rainfall: Local 49 mm, Regional 111.3 mm = 79% of normal Minimum temperatures: Local 6 deg, Regional 4.9 deg = +2.5 deg Maximum Temperatures: Local 14 deg, Regional 9.4 deg = +1.6 deg

What is the weather forecast for February? Met Office says unsettled with mild temperatures and rain and strong winds, but some brighter, colder intervals with frost and fog. Can we add any more from the weather lore forecast? Shepherd of Banbury says if the end of October and beginning of November are warm and rainy, (they were) then February is likely to be frosty and cold. Jet Stream forecast at the start of February shows it across the UK and low pressure with winds from the west. Probably mild, wet and windy.

Croaking February!

It's the time of year for romantic croaking. Our common frog is found in damp areas near a pond, layers of dead leaves or under stone. They lead solitary lives and don't mature until 3 years old. The frog will hibernate in muddy burrows or the bottom of a pond during the cold months usually from late October to February. So, when February arrives, the frogs are on the move!

A mature male makes its way back to the pond it came from. Once there he will start croaking at night to attract a female. The male frog has hard swellings on his front legs called nuptial pads which helps him once the female arrives to cling and ride on her back until they finish mating. The female will then lay a clump of eggs from a few hundred to 5,000 in the shallow water. Within 2 – 3 weeks the eggs hatch into tadpoles and development continues until they are small frogs. We occasionally get amphibians as casualties. Although these are cold blooded animals, they need heat to heal.



They have quite a wide diet of insects, worms, snails, slugs, spiders and occasionally small amphibians. The adults have quite a lot of predators such as stoats, weasels, polecats, badgers and otters. Cats will kill them but rarely eat them. A large number of frogs are killed on our roads by motor vehicles.

Gardens are dangerous places with spades and strimmers at work. Try and check the area before you start if possible. We will still try to help a frog or toad as long as it is an injury that once healed, means they will have full movement and continue a natural life.



The start of the fishing season in March is the time to get your fishing licence. It is so important that all discarded fishing tackle is disposed of safely. 70 -80% of all water birds are brought in to us due to fishing tackle injuries. Enjoy the wildlife around you but by making sure you don't leave any line or hooks behind, you will save lives.

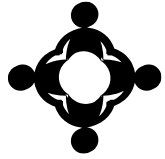

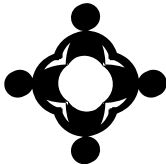

BUSES FOR OUR VILLAGES

Before Christmas I attended an online meeting in which Somerset Bus partnership (SBP) presented their proposal for Somerset bus funding in 2025/26. Enmore and neighbouring Goathurst used to have 3 buses a week to Bridgwater, and despite opposition, there are now none, apart from an almost empty service to Bridgwater College. Enmore Road is a major commuter route between Bridgwater and Taunton via Kingston St Mary. And also it acts as an alternative route for motorists stranded on the M5, when it is closed.

I was so disappointed that the SBP Proposal appeared not to address the needs of our rural communities that I emailed Somerset Council to express my disappointment with the Proposal. SBP claim to want to create an equitable Service that meets the needs of all Somerset, but seem just to be trying to enhance existing services. I was hoping new routes would be suggested.

However, Paragraph 6 of the Proposal does mention a Bridgwater town service during Monday to Saturday daytimes from Bridgwater Railway Station running via the Town Centre to the newer development areas of Stockmoor Drive, and south to terminate at North Petherton and the new development areas there. So I suggested Enmore could be linked into such a service, as we had bus services before those new areas existed. They aren't far from the Station either.

I do feel that the whole free bus pass benefit isn't equitable, when the vulnerable and elderly in rural areas cannot use public transport. The lack of public transport can affect the mental health of rural residents and prevent their accessing medical assistance. I have even heard it suggested that Somerset Council should be looking at a 2 bus solution - rural and urban.

Now Enmore PC has directed me to ask Enmore and Goathurst residents whether they would REALLY use a bus service if one was available. And of course they can also comment on the draft proposals directly. LET ME KNOW. 01278 672742 or email amandahubbard@btinternet.com I have the details of the SBP proposal also.

Traditional Yorkshire Mock Goose Pie



Both my Grannie and Mum used to make this. Of course they were from Yorkshire.

You have heard, of course, of 'Bangers 'n Mash'. This is a variation on this, you could always pretend it was a goose – Yorkshire humour dating back to war time.

Ingredients

- 450g/1lb pack of good quality pork sausages, skinned
- 450g/1lb mashed potatoes – Maris Piper or King Edward
- 1 large onion, sliced and fried in a little butter
- 110g/4oz mushrooms, sliced to fry with the onions
- Salt, freshly ground black pepper, mustard powder to season
- Knob of butter
- Dash of cold milk or double cream
- Good handful of grated Cheddar cheese

Method

1. Peel the potatoes, cut them into chunks, start the potatoes off in cold salted water and bring them to the boil, then cook for 15 minutes until fork-tender, and mash.
2. Season the potatoes with a good knob of butter, salt, black pepper, mustard powder and a dash of milk till you have the correct consistency you want, then set aside
3. Fry the sliced onions and mushrooms in a little butter till golden colour
4. Skin the sausages and squash them together before spreading over the bottom of a gratin dish or similar ovenware container
5. Place the fried onions and mushrooms on top of the sausage meat
6. Top with the seasoned potatoes, forking the top so it becomes crisp and brown
7. Sprinkle over a handful of grated Cheddar cheese on top of potatoes
8. Cook for around 60 minutes at 180c/gas mark 5 until the cheese is golden brown
9. Serve at once with some nice seasonal green vegetables and good gravy.

NB. I cook the sausage meat first in the oven, then pour off excess fat, I add sage to the onions and omit the mushrooms, then serve with baked beans and apple sauce rather than vegetables and gravy. A tasty midweek meal.
